

Lions Club International Purposes

- **To Organize**, charter and supervise service clubs to be known as Lions clubs.
- **To Coordinate** the activities and standardize the administration of Lions clubs.
- **To Create** and foster a spirit of understanding among the peoples of the world.
- **To Promote** the principles of good government and good citizenship.
- **To Take** an active interest in the civic, cultural, social and moral welfare of the community.
- **To Unite** the clubs in the bonds of friendship, good fellowship and mutual understanding.
- **To Provide** a forum for the open discussion of all matters of public interest; provided, however, that partisan politics and sectarian religion shall not be debated by club members.
- **To Encourage** service-minded people to serve their community without personal financial reward, and to encourage efficiency and promote high ethical standards in commerce, industry, professions, public works and private endeavors.

Lions Code of Ethics

- **To Show** my faith in the worthiness of my vocation by industrious application to the end that I may merit a reputation for quality of service.
- **To Seek** success and to demand all fair remuneration or profit as my just due, but to accept no profit or success at the price of my own self-respect lost because of unfair advantage taken or because of questionable acts on my part.
- **To Remember** that in building up my business it is not necessary to tear down another's; to be loyal to my clients or customers and true to myself.
- Whenever a doubt arises as to the right or ethics of my position or action towards others, to resolve such doubt against myself.
- **To Hold** friendship as an end and not a means. To hold that true friendship exists not on account of the service performed by one to another, but that true friendship demands nothing but accepts service in the spirit in which it is given.
- Always to bear in mind my obligations as a citizen to my nation, my state, and my community, and to give them my unswerving loyalty in word, act, and deed. To give them freely of my time, labor and means.
- **To Aid** others by giving my sympathy to those in distress, my aid to the weak, and my substance to the needy.
- **To Be Careful** with my criticism and liberal with my praise; to build up and not destroy.

CLUB OFFICERS AND DUTIES

IMMEDIATE PAST-PRESIDENT—Assist the President as an advisor giving him/her the benefit of his/her experience gained as president. Chair the elections of the executive officers for the next Lions year.

PRESIDENT—Is the Chief Executive Officer and presides over all club meetings. It is your duty to appoint your club members to the various committees of the club and you are EX-Officio of all committees. With the assistance of your Vice-Presidents and the Directors, you will see that all committees function smoothly. Along with the Secretary will be Active Members of the District Governor's Advisory Committee and as such attend the Quarterly Committee Meetings of the Zone.

SECRETARY - One of the most important offices of the Club. The success of our Club depends largely upon the efficiency with which duties are performed. Also acts as a liaison officer between the Club, Lions International, MD 19 and District 19-H.

TREASURER - The custodian of all Club funds, depositing all monies received in such Bank or Banks designated by the Board of Directors. You will be part of the finance committee in preparing a budget and distributing funds upon direction of the Board of Directors using recognized and accepted business procedure.

VICE-PRESIDENTS - Will substitute for the President in his/her absence. The duties of the Directors also apply to you. Under the direction of the President you will oversee the function of such Committees as may be assigned to you. DIRECTORS - Assist in formulation and executing the policies of the Club. All new business is considered and shaped by the Board of Directors. You will oversee the functions of such Committees as may be assigned to you and generally assist the President in the operation of the Club.

MEMBERSHIP DIRECTOR - Lead the Membership Committee and help in developing and implementing a growth program approved by the Board of Directors. Encourage and assist Club members to bring in qualified members. Seek out members not attending to see why they are not attending and possibly help them return to the Club.

LION TAMER - Responsible for the Club property (regalia), see that flags, gong, etc. are properly placed and all materials distributed; with the assistance of the Past-Presidents, act as Official Club Greeters.

TAIL TWISTER - Maintains harmony and encourages good feelings and fun in the meetings. Impose and collect fines at meetings, using your best judgment. Use your resourcefulness to prompt fellowship, fun and laughter by making the members forget for the time their business and worries they may have. REMEMBER, the RULE is that the FLOOR is yours for that period of time.

MEMBERS - In general are expected to attend Club meetings and participate in club projects.

REMEMBER: you represent the Lions Club of Abbotsford and Lions Club International. HAVE FUN and enjoy the comradeship of your Club members and Lions everywhere.

INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF LIONS CLUBS

The International Association of Lions Clubs began as the dream of Chicago insurance man Melvin Jones, who wondered why local business clubs -- he was an active member of one - could not expand their horizons from purely business concerns to the betterment of their communities and the world at large.

Jones' idea struck a chord within his own group, the Business Circle of Chicago, and they authorized him to explore his concept with similar organizations from around the United States. His efforts resulted in an organizational meeting at a local hotel on June 7, 1917.

The 12 men who gathered there overcame a natural sense of loyalty to their parent clubs, voted the "Association of Lions Clubs" into existence, and issued a call for a national convention to be held in Dallas, Texas, USA in October of the same year.

Thirty-six delegates representing 22 clubs from nine states heeded the call, approved the "Lions Clubs" designation, and elected Dr. William P. Woods of Indiana as their first president. Guiding force and founder Melvin Jones named acting secretary, thus began an association with Lionism that only ended with his death in 1961.

That first convention also began to define what Lionism was to become. A constitution and by-laws were adopted, the colors of purple and gold approved, and a start made on Lionism's Objectives and Code of Ethics.

One of the objects was startling for an era that prided itself on mercenary individualism, and has remained one of the main tenets of Lionism ever since. "No Club," it read, "shall hold out the financial betterment of its members as its object."

Community leaders soon began to organize clubs throughout the United States, and the association became "international" with the formation of the Windsor, Ontario, Canada Lions Club in 1920. Clubs were later organized in China, Mexico, and Cuba. By 1927, membership stood at 60,000 in 1,183 clubs.

In 1935, Panama became home to the first Central American club, with the first South American club being organized in Columbia the following year. Lionism reached Europe in 1948, as clubs were chartered in Sweden, Switzerland, and France. In 1952, the first club was chartered in Japan.

Since then, the association has become truly global, with clubs in more than 207 countries and geographical areas worldwide.

The Name

The proper name of the association is "The International Association of Lions Clubs." Many Lions, however, prefer the use of the shorter form of "Lions Clubs International."

The Emblem

Throughout the world, Lions are recognized by the emblem they wear on their lapels. It consists of a gold letter "L" on a circular purple field. Bordering this is a circular gold area with two lion profiles at either side facing away from the center. The word "Lions" appears at the top, and "International" at the bottom. Symbolically, the lions face both past and future - proud of the past and confident of the future. Lions wear their emblem with pride.

The Motto

The motto of every Lion is simply "We Serve." What better way to express the true mission of Lionism?

Our Vision

To be the global leader in community and humanitarian service.

Official Colors

The royal colors of purple and gold were selected as the official colors when the association was organized in 1917. **Purple** stands for loyalty to friends and to one's self, and for integrity of mind and heart. **Gold** symbolizes sincerity of purpose, liberality in judgement, purity in life and generosity in mind, heart and purpose toward humanity.


Mission Statement


